## One Hundred Years Ago

*From the Enterprise, Sept. - Dec. 1915, circulation 2,953 in the first week of October.*

September sees the Lakeside Hotel at Thompson's Lake close for the season except for Saturdays and Sundays, and many cottage owners are returning to their Albany homes. Apples are being harvested, and local cider producers offer 25 cents per hundredweight for them. The West Berne writer reports that Haverly's mill can make cider from your own apples and a 'for sale' listing offers 72 new apple barrels for 22 cents each. Feed grinding is available at the Becker Bros. mill in Berne on Wednesday and Saturday. The Thompson's Lake writer says frequent rain has hurt the buckwheat harvest in early October, and buckwheat feed is \$23 a ton. As cooler weather comes in, Standard Oil of New York advertises the Perfection oil heater, smokeless and portable. Ten hours of comfort on one gallon of kerosene, "the most inexpensive form of heat."

Fall entertainment includes church suppers featuring chicken and oysters. At Thompson's Lake, the Church's oyster supper brings in \$14. The Church will also feature a "stereopticon lecture" the day before Halloween, and on the same day, the West Berne Methodist Church will host a Halloween supper, and Berne Reformed has a Halloween masquerade. Farther afield, you can enjoy a one-way trip to New York City aboard a Hudson Navigation Co. boat for one dollar, or \$1.50 for a round trip. There are also "tourist automobile rates" of \$4 to \$10 dollars, one way, and \$6 to \$15, round trip. (cont'd on page 2)

## BROADBAND FORUM

As November begins, election activity heats up. All Albany County Towns except Knox vote to go "wet" with alcohol sales. A proposed amendment of the New York constitution, to give women voting rights, goes down in defeat by some 200,000 votes, despite an assurance in a suffrage ad that "Evolution is not going to stop or turn backward when women get the vote."

Other reported November events include snow visible from Thompson's Lake on distant mountain tops, a horse and wagon mishap on the state road in South Berne when a "wifflebolt" detaches, and Mr. Carl's auto going over an embankment near the letter "S" on the Albany road. Mr. Carl's auto will be issued a new and improved license plate next year, according to the State Department [which included the motor vehicle bureau at that time], "autoists" will be issued a more visible plate embossed with "New York 1916" and having hyphenated alpha and numerical characters.

Mr. Carl will not be driving in mid-December. Two storms combine to produce a snow event labeled the worst since the 1888 blizzard. Strong winds create drifts of six to 15 feet around Albany County, three are dead in Albany City, the Thompson's Lake writer reports that mail delivery is stopped from Dec. 11 through Dec. 20, and some 40,000 men are enlisted to shovel snow in New York City. With classic understatement, two Berne correspondents refer to this as "real winter weather ... the past few days" and a "bad storm" that prevents church services.

*A note on suffrage: The New York Constitutional suffrage battle was won in 1917, three years before the U.S Constitution was amended, and 48 years after the Wyoming Territory gave its women the right to vote. Albany City again voted "no" in 1917.*

**RIBBON CUTTING FOR REOPENING OF BRIDGE IN BERNE HAMLET**

On September 4, Assemblyman Angelo Santabarbara, was joined by Berne Supervisor Kevin Crosier, County Executive Daniel P. McCoy and other elected officials as they cut the ribbon and officially reopened the Route 443 bridge over the Fox Creek in the Town of Berne. Work on the \$1.01 million project began in the summer of 2014 and was completed in two phases to minimize its impact on school traffic. This summer the state Department of Transportation replaced the aging bridge, which carries more than 1,200 motor vehicles every day.

The work began last summer with the widening of the intersection of Route 443 and Route 156, which had previously been difficult for school buses to safely navigate. A damaged building near the intersection was also removed to improve sight distance and the turning radius.

The reopening of the bridge, which had been closed since June 29, means the community has access to one of its critical means of transportation; and school bus drivers will have a safer route to school.

## HIGHWAY HAPPENINGS

The Town of Berne is very pleased to have been approved for a grant which will provide funding for a new salt shed that will be shared with Albany County at the Town Highway Garage. Construction is expected to begin in the spring of 2016. This facility will also be shared with Berne- Knox-Westerlo School supplying clean material for roads in the Berne district.

This season, six roads have been paved and road crews will be trimming several more roads. A new truck has been purchased and will be available for the upcoming snow season.

With the snow season just around the corner, the Town Highway Department is requesting your help and cooperation regarding mailboxes and snow removal. It is important to remember that mailboxes must be set at 48" off the ground to avoid interfering with snowplowing.

Also, as inconvenient as this may be, it is necessary that vehicles are parked at least 12 feet away from the edge of the highway during snowstorms and shortly thereafter. This amount of space is needed for the plow to wing back the snow in anticipation of the next storm.

Residents are also reminded that the moving of snow into the roadway from driveways or parking areas is an illegal practice and may put passing vehicles in danger as well as making proper clearing of the roadway by town plows impossible.

## ***LIBRARY NOTES***

Individuals from the community met during September in focus groups to discuss their aspirations for Berne and how the library fits into that vision. The Library Board of Trustees will be using this information along with the results of the community survey from the last courier to develop a five year plan for the library. Thank you to all who shared your thoughts.

The last five year plan for the library was to move into a new building which has been accomplished with the help of NYS Library Construction Grants. In fact the Berne Public Library has received \$285,637 of grant money so far. The library recently applied for its fourth NYS Library Construction Grant. The monies will be used to replace all single pane glass with insulated glass and clean and repoint the brickwork of the building. The Friends of the Library are providing the 25% matching funds needed for the grant, so please support their efforts.

The community room at the library is hopping with activity. In addition to library programs, the room is being used by non-profit community groups such as the Girl Scouts, HHA, and the Berne Historical Society.
