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

The Town of Berne has just approved its 2017 budget and it will result in a 3% property tax decrease. This will be the fourth straight year of property tax cuts for the Town of Berne.

Also, you may have noticed a check you received just a few weeks ago called the Property Tax Freeze Credit. You received this check because the Town Board, and the Albany County Executive's Office worked together to develop a government efficiency plan. This plan, along with the fact that we stayed under the property tax cap, has resulted in taxpayer savings for Berne residents.

On September 19th, the Town received a letter from New York State Department of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation announcing that St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church was officially listed on the State's Register of Historic Places. In addition, St. Paul's nomination will be forwarded on to the Keeper of the National Register in Washington, D.C. If the Keeper approves the nomination, St. Paul's will be listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

One Hundred Years Ago

One Hundred Years Ago— From the Enterprise, Nov. 1916– Jan 5, 1916.

Harvest season is winding down, and the State's apple harvest is estimated to be about 12 million barrels. If you have apples for pressing into cider, you can sell them for 25 cents per hundred pounds at Voorheesville or bring them to Chesbro and Sand's mill in Berne to be pressed, but remember to pick up your juice by November 17. While in Berne, check out the newest Village improvement - concrete sidewalks.

It's a State-wide and national election year (incumbent Woodrow Wilson vs. Charles Evans Hughes), and sample ballots and ads are in print. One large ad is on behalf of Henry Ford of automobile fame. His views are in alignment with Wilson, and Ford says we "should guard against Wall Street influences again securing control of our government ... equal work deserves equal pay. Hence all women in our employment who do equal work shall receive equal pay."

On Tuesday morning, Nov. 21, Thompson's Lake sees its first snow, nine days before Thanksgiving. And on December 5th, there is thunder and lightening out of a clear sky. Also, at the Lake, Mr. and Mrs. Palmatier close their hotel for the season.

West Berne reports that a number of residents took a bus to Albany to shop. If you mail at least one dollar to the Albany City Saving Institution, they will open an account with 4% interest and mail back a Christmas bank book. Although it is wisely not advertised as a gift item, F.C. Hayes in Altamont offers the "Elite" electric vacuum cleaner for \$25. Get a free demonstration before you buy.

As Christmas looms, the Altamont Bakery offers fruit cakes, and pumpkin and mince pies made to order. "Telephone your wants." The number is "21-F 4." [This was a time of switchboard operators who were well-known in the communities. In November, the East Berne correspondent reported that while Leona Ames was away, Miss Edith Wagoner would take her place. Ed.]

Grant for New Playground at the Berne Town Park

Play is often talked about as if it were a relief from serious learning. But for children, play is serious learning. Play really is the work of childhood.

Child development experts agree, play is essential for children. Imaginative, unstructured, self-directed play serves to develop creativity, self-reliance, and empowers the child to take charge of his life.

Understanding the importance of play to our children, we sought, and have been awarded, a \$12,000 Priority Purchase Grant from Assemblyman Angelo Santabarbara to develop a playground for the Berne Town Park.

The approved plans include one single-level fort and one multi-level fort. It will include a suspension bridge, with safety rails, which will connect the two structures. A climbing wall, a fire pole, a 4-foot double slide, and a single 6-foot slide will provide access and egress to the

structures. An ADA transfer station and landing platform are important features of the playground, as are monkey bars and log climbers. All the equipment and plans have been approved by a certified playground safety inspector, and will be installed according to the guidelines set forth in the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission's recommendations for playground safety. Installation is planned for late spring of 2017.

BKW Students at Switzkill Farm

On November 3, a beautiful Thursday afternoon, 60 fifth graders from Berne-Knox-Westerlo Central School District visited the Switzkill Farm town park with their teachers to walk one of the newly marked trails. They spent about



an hour and a half on the Red Trail with two guides, Roger Chrysler and Richard Ronconi - both active Switzkill Farm supporters.



The children learned about the history of the Farm and reasons for the old stone walls found throughout the area. They identified and collected various leaves, ferns, lichens, fossils and even scat (animal droppings). The students identified different ecological areas: ponds, maple and hickory groves, pine forests, shale pits and the associated flora and fauna. All the students diligently noted their observations for later presentation in class.

In addition, Richard Ronconi of Partridge Run Farm and Apiary, gave a talk about bees to a group of interested citizens (left).

We hope that BKW and the rest of the community continue to use the Switzkill Farm as a valuable educational and recreational resource.

Neighbors Helping Neighbors

Town of Berne residents-

Well, it is that time of the year. Winter is here. Please watch for icy and snowy roads. Some helpful tips to help the Highway and the County plow your roads and make them safe are: do not park on roads; keep trash cans at least 2 ft off road; don't relocate snow from driveways into the roadway (it is illegal – not to mention dangerous!); fences/obstructions should be at least 10ft from the edge of road; and, mailboxes should be at least 41"-45" above the surface and at least 8-12" from edge of road. These tips can be found on the Cornell local roads program.

Also, the walls are done on the new salt shed (see below) and the roof system will be applied Nov. 15th. This is great for the Town residents. Clean and dry material will save a lot of time and money.

Recently, we have had vandalism to Town road signs. Please contact me anytime if you see any more destruction to our road signs. My cell is 518-573-3002 and the Highway Office number is 518-872-1448, ext 113.

Community Accountability Board

Berne's Community Accountability Board District Attorney's Office. This includes (CAB) is looking for members. basic orientation to our criminal justice

CAB was created by the Albany County District Attorney's Office to give the community a voice in the criminal justice process. It was designed to serve as an alternative to traditional criminal sentencing for non-violent, quality of life offenses. Its goal is to help offenders recognize the harm done to their victims, the community, and themselves, and to reduce the possibility of recidivism

Comprised of trained and certified citizens, CAB offers the offender the opportunity to repair the damage done by their offense through the assignment of specific activities that must be fulfilled for successful completion of the program. The Judge, Assistant District Attorney and the Defense Attorney must approve the offender's participation in the program. Berne's Community Accountability Board meets regularly to review cases referred by the court.

All CAB members must receive certification training through the Albany County District Attorney's Office. This includes basic orientation to our criminal justice system, the restorative justice system, and the CAB process. Ongoing, in-service training and attendance at informational meetings are required. All members must commit to a minimum of one-year's service and participation in at least one CAB session per month.

Additionally, Board members must be willing to interact confidentially with victims and offenders in a non-judgmental, balanced and fair approach. An openmind, a knowledge of the community, and the capacity to listen and communicate effectively are essential attributes for potential members. All CAB members serve at the pleasure of the Albany County District Attorney.

The Community Accountability Board provides a rewarding, direct service experience to our community that assists and supports crime victims and their offenders. Please contact Pastor Bob Hoffman at 872.1553 if you would like to join this most rewarding community advocacy group.

Berne Public Library—Read All About It

The community indicated in the 2015 surveys and focus groups that the library should be open more hours. This goal became part of the 2016-2019 strategic plan. The Library Board of Trustees is pleased to announce that the library was able to obtain funding for four more hours a week. Community support has enabled the Berne Public Library and the Friends of the Berne Library to continue improving the collection, library space, and programs.

The Friends were able to provide matching funds for the 2016 New York State Library Construction Grant Program. This grant provided money for the installation of energy-efficient windows. The grant also covered repair of the outside brickwork.


